Uniform Reminder

A uniform dress code reinforces in students a pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of our school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the dress code.

With the changing weather approaching we are mindful of this impacting which uniform the students will be most comfortable in. For the first 2 weeks of term 2 we don't mind which uniform your child chooses to wear on dress uniform days - they can choose the summer or winter uniform. However we do ask that whichever uniform is chosen is worn correctly. Eg: all summer or all winter uniform - not a mixture of both.

Other uniform reminders:

- School uniform includes black school shoes.
- All hair that sits below a student's collar must be tied up.
- Hats must be worn until the end of term 1 and from the beginning of term 4 but are strongly encouraged all year.
- Jewellery is not to be worn apart from a watch (smart watches not preferred) and, for students with pierced ears, a pair of simple studs or sleepers in the ear lobes only.
- Makeup, false eyelashes, nail polish or false nails are not permitted.

Beginning of the Day

As previously noted, due to the incoming EBA, our first bell will now be rung at 8.40am. A wide range of issues and considerations have been taken into account, with this outcome the least disruptive on families and staff. Staff need time in the mornings to prepare their classrooms for the day as well as the school needing to ensure the implementation of the EBA is introduced in a manner that supports teachers' workload. This difficult decision has been negotiated with staff, the union and the school advisory board in a lengthy process.

A staff member will be on duty outside from **8.40am**. We encourage students to quickly drop their bags inside and then spend time with their friends in the yard before the start of classes. Although this may cause some inconvenience for families, Kelly Club is able to be accessed until 8.40am each morning.

Please do not leave students unattended at school prior to 8.40am. It is a child safety risk and they cannot be supervised by staff until 8.40am. We take child safety seriously at St Margaret's therefore students left unsupervised prior to 8.40am will be asked to join Kelly Club. Our staff, many who are also parents and must negotiate a busy morning, appreciate your support and understanding as we adjust to this altered bell time.

Literacy News

Literacy Update

One of the main curriculum goals this year is to increase a positive reading culture across the whole school. The great news is that teachers have already started making progress in Term One.

The Year 3-6 teachers have continued to use Scholastic's Literacy Pro. A program that matches student's reading ability (Lexile level) to a suitable text. These books are housed in the main hallway and have recently been updated and rearranged for easier student access.

Year 5 and 6 classes have been working on building Reading Stamina: to read independently, for uninterrupted, extended periods of time. Some of our students have been able to build their reading stamina up to 15 minutes, that is an incredible achievement.

The junior classes will be studying minibeasts and writing information reports this term so we have purchased a large selection of beautiful nonfiction books that will hopefully pique our students' interests.

We have also been able to source some vibrant, nonfiction big books for our preps, who will use these to learn about the wider world and build their vocabulary.

Another crucial step in building and maintaining a strong reading culture is to have a school library that is purposeful, inviting, and conducive to reading. Our hardworking P & F committee has organised a (limited ticket) raffle fundraiser to win a Thermomix. Proceeds of your \$20 ticket will go towards a library upgrade to provide better seating and appropriate shelving. This will create an inspiring space that is designed to encourage learning and will bolster a strong reading culture where literacy is valued.

'Bully No More' and 'The Cyber Bully'

As part of our ongoing commitment to the wellbeing of our students and child safety, all classes will attend drama presentations on Thursday in the multi-purpose room by Starrs Production.

11.40am 'Bully No More' (P/1/2) 12.30pm 'The Cyber Bully' (3/4) 2.20pm 'The Cyber Bully' (5/6)

These plays end with question and answer sessions with the actors and are followed up with classroom discussion. You can read a little about the shows below.

BULLY NO MORE

Bully No More dramatises a troubled friendship between two students at primary school. Eric can't understand why he is always being picked on by Becksy at lunch time. He confides in his good friend Ralph who gives him a few home truths and some great advice. He sets out to discover why Becksy treats him the way she does.

As Eric begins to understand what is making Becksy act the way she does he discovers that he and Ralph can help her through peer support and friendship. They discover they can be friends after all.

The play dramatises what bullying is; physical, verbal, visual and offers positive strategies that enable children to deal with bullying. A de-brief session is offered after the play.

THE CYBER BULLY

Zoe and her cousin Edward have a lot of time on their hands. They are always online. One day Zoe discovers she can torment the girls she doesn't like in her class using her favourite social networking sites and her mobile phone. She and Edward let loose thinking its harmless fun. Neither realises the impact of their actions. Things get a little crazy and Zoe starts suffering text-iety, post traumatic texting disorder not to mention post text depression. Eventually Edward and Zoe face the consequences of their actions.

The Cyber Bully is an entertaining play that explores the serious issue of cyber bullying among young people. The play looks at the misuse of texting, social networking sites and unauthorized use of pictures and footage. There will be a de-brief session offered after the performance where the actors will address important issues that are raised during the play and occur due to cyber bullying.
