Last Friday, November 10, students and staff gathered at our newly refurbished flagpoles to commemorate Remembrance Day. Each class laid a wreath that they made at the foot of the flagpole and, like millions worldwide, paused in silence to mark Remembrance Day at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. It gave our students and staff a chance to stop and think about those who have fought and died in conflict since World War 1.



Students last week spent time in class discussing the importance of this day, including the significance of a red poppy. Poppies symbolise hope for our future and commemorate the soldiers who fought and died in war. Although we do not glorify war, it is an opportunity to reflect on those who have given their lives in conflicts so that we may live in freedom and peace.

We acknowledge the traditional owners of the land that St Margaret's is located on, the Wathaurong people. We pay our respects to Elders' past, present and emerging and acknowledge the importance of Aboriginal culture in all the work we do.

Remember By Charlotte Butcher

20th of November, 1918

He was gone. Lost in time. The war was over.

The big tree swayed with the wind like a pair of graceful dancing flamingos. The town was silent. The usual roar of cars was absent. Because everyone was mourning. Mourning for their loved ones that they'd lost. Tears like tiny, glittering diamonds rolled down my cheek like a waterfall of sorrow. A sad tune played by the trumpet filled my ears as the town bowed their heads in remembrance of the brave, courageous and valiant soldiers who fought in the barbaric war.

I sat beside the tree away from the crowd. I watched as the sun sank below the horizon, spilling its last burst of light beyond the town. I thought of how my dad had said that the sun would follow me, guide me through hard times. But all I felt was that the sun was my foe leaving me behind. We used to play in the big tree and pretend that the trunk was our seats and the leaves were our joy ride to paradise. We were destiny's best friends. But he perished in the war. Never to return.

I curled up under the tree and imagined the great big car that rich men drove around the village. Suddenly the branches of the tree curled into a large shiny car with fire flies as lights and big leaves as extremely comfortable seats. I gasped with astonishment as the car revved and the engine roared like an infuriated tiger. I grasped the wooden steering wheel, doubt running through my veins. Was this a dream? I pinched myself hard on the cheek. Negative. It really hurt. I suddenly felt nauseous. Why did I pinch myself? I took a deep breath and imagined something else.

I imagined a crazy vehicle with wings made of iron and a body of steel. Inside were hundreds of seats with a pilot's area at the front and a restroom at the back. This vehicle would be unique. It would be the first machine made by a girl. What made it even more wonderful is that this vehicle could fly. It would cut through the strongest of winds in the highest of skies. The vehicle would soar over the

heads of mesmerized men and women. This vehicle would be called the plane.

This time I was ready. The leaves and branches of the tree came alive like squirming snakes, as they entwined with each other to make the machine of my dreams. Because I knew it was my dreams. My thoughts. But it was somewhat real in its own magical way. I opened my eyes to the real world. The dazzling sunlight showered my features. I was on the soft, cool green grass, laying under the trunk of the tree. The mysterious *uncanny* tree. It wasn't a dream that had just happened. It was a memory. A memory of my father. He would always be with me in our favourite meeting place. The big magical tree.

Out of my dress pocket I pull an old tethered peacock feather. It was my father's favourite from his collection.

'This is for you Faye,'' my father had said as people scurried by saying goodbye to their loved ones. He handed me a magnificent peacock feather.

'But Daddy this one's your favourite,'' I had said, shocked. He and my mother exchanged a gloomy look. I was too young then to know but now I do. My father wouldn't tell me that he might not come back. He was too afraid that I would become miserable when he left for the journey of his life.

'That's right, and that's why I'm giving it to you. You're even more special than this gorgeous feather. You deserve this more than anyone in the entire world. *Keep going when I'm gone Faye. Promise*'.

I hugged him tight. I promised to keep this feather safe as a memory of him.

But this power might be dangerous and people might think I'm going crazy. Me and my mother might be isolated from other people.

So for the last time I closed my eyes and imagined my father for he would always be with me. I opened my eyes. There, in front of me was my father. He wasn't real. But ghostly, and his features were weirdly non-existent. Yet he was still beaming. From that day on I knew that my father would always be with me. Always be with me in my heart.

Forever and Always.

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
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
