Is Fluency Really That Important? YES!

Fluency is an essential skill children need for reading.

Children have poor fluency if:

- They read many words in a passage or text incorrectly.
- They read slowly and with obvious effort.
- They read in a stilted or robotic way.

Reading fluency is generally defined as having three components: <u>accuracy, rate, and expression (prosody</u>).But what does it mean?

Children have good fluency if:


- They read aloud with accuracy, they can decode (read the words) familiar and unfamiliar words
- They read aloud with automaticity, reading quickly and effortlessly, having a smooth, fluid pace.
- They read aloud with prosody, making the reading sound natural, using appropriate expression where necessary and pausing at commas and full stops.

Every day at school our students from Foundation to Year 6 practice their fluency with these things in mind. If you walk around the school during Literacy you will see students sitting together reading and listening to one another, giving each other feedback on what they sound like, what they are doing well and how they can improve.

Your child's teacher has worked hard to put this practice in place so please ask your child about how their fluency partners are going.

At Home:

An easy way you can assist your child at home is to read aloud and model what good reading sounds like. Make deliberate attempts to be mindful of how you use your voice. Use expression and read smoothly and at a good pace.

The FIRE Carrier Commissioning Ceremony

The commissioning ceremony for the FIRE carriers was absolutely electrifying! Despite the long journey to Melbourne, every moment was worthwhile. Upon arrival, our first order of business was admiring the remarkable paintings. My favourite painting was an illustration of Uluru with people jumping for joy under it, and below that was the parliament building. Next, we found ourselves in a room filled with rows of chairs and a prominent projector. As we settled into our seats, the presentation began.

The initial segment delved into the rich history of the First Nations People, providing a captivating insight into their heritage. Did you know that there was a fossil of a man named Mungo Man? (Mungo National park is an area in NSW were the fossil was found) Forty thousand years ago was when Mungo Man was buried (just to scale, he was buried thirty-six thousand years



before the pyramids) and how neatly he was preserved and laid to rest shows how advanced the First Nations peoples were. We also talked about what reconciliation means to us. I wrote that it means to come back to someone after wrong-doing and learn from our mistakes, forgiveness, and walking together. Another interesting fact is that the Indigenous peoples lived with the Megafauna (giant marsupials, mammals, lizards and birds that lived around twelve thousand years ago) so maybe some of the indigenous stories like Bunjil the Eagle and the Rainbow Serpent were inspired by Megafauna. Directly after was our scrumptious snack.

Onto the next segment, was our time to dream big! We had to brainstorm ideas for integrating Aboriginal culture and history into our school curriculum. We let our ideas flow out, in the end we got through two pages of dreams and ideas, from littles things like displaying kids' drawings of Indigenous stories to something big like an Indigenous information night and we want to share it all to the school community. It was awesome.



Afterwards, we looked forward to our delicious lunch, followed by our commissioning ceremony. Standing around in a circle, our corroboree, we had a professed reading, followed by us getting commissioned, and talking about what it means to be a FIRE carrier subsequently leading to our lengthy expedition home.

The main thing we took out of it is how miraculous and rich the Indigenous culture and history is, there is so much knowledge to attain! I would like to thank the FIRE carrier teachers; Miss Fiona & Mrs Philbrick who took us to this phenomenal experience.
