# Classroom Mastery - Update

At St Margaret's we have been focussing on previously shared behaviour routines and expectations centering around a 'Cue to Start' and Entry and Exit Routines.

These behaviour routines have been explicitly taught, and are reinforced throughout every day in authentic contexts. They are linked to our school values: Respectful, Responsible and Safe. These classroom routines work to both add to our classroom safety, and as a foundation to manage and maintain productive learning environments.

Last Monday, Courtney O'Donnell from Classroom Mastery came to our school to work with us around the routines. She visited classrooms, giving feedback to teachers on their routine execution, and to the Leadership team around how best to support teachers and students and the steps to ensure these routines are embedded in our school.

Courtney was very complimentary about the calm and settled environment of St Margaret's and the kind and caring approach she saw of teachers in their interactions with students. We all have a few things to work on as we work to embed these classroom routines, but are very proud of how far we have come in such a short time. Already, teachers and students can see the positive impact the entry and exit routines have had whilst students are moving around the school, and the 'Cue to Start' has shown to work well at school, and also in external venues such as Landy Field and Scienceworks.

# Behaviour Routines at St Margaret's

# Cue to Start

We show respect and responsibility by giving our full attention, showing we are ready to start learning.

Teacher says: 3-2-1 Waterfall

Student: Raises hands in the air and moves fingers whilst making the waterfall sound.

# **Entry Routines**

We show safety, respect and responsibility when entering the classroom.

- We line up in pairs outside the classroom,
- We then move quietly into the room,
- · We stand behind our desk.
- When asked we sit quietly with our eyes focused on the teacher.

# **Exit Routines**

We show safety, respect and responsibility when exiting the classroom.

- We quietly pack up.
- We gather at set place quietly (and say prayer if it is the end of the day)
- We stand quietly with our eyes focussed on the teacher.
- We say 'good afternoon' and wait to be dismissed by the teacher.
- We leave the classroom and walk quietly.

# Updates to Our Assessment Approach: Embracing the Science of Reading & Flourishing Learners.

At St Margaret's, we are committed to providing the best possible education for our students. In light of recent advancements in educational research, we are excited to announce changes to our assessment approach, guided by the principles of the Science of Reading and MACS Flourishing Learners initiative. These changes aim to fill existing gaps and improve our students' reading proficiency and overall literacy skills.

What is the Science of Reading? The Science of Reading is a comprehensive, interdisciplinary body of research that encompasses the best practices for teaching reading. It draws from psychology, cognitive science, linguistics, and education to understand how children learn to read, why some struggle, and how we can effectively address these challenges. Each fortnight in the newsletter we will explain more about the Science of Reading and Learning, and our work with MACS Flourishing Learners Initiative.

### Key Changes in Our Assessment Approach:

- 1. Evidence-Based Practices:
  - We are integrating evidence-based practices into our teaching of reading, and reading assessments. This includes systematic phonics instruction, which emphasises the relationship between sounds and their corresponding letters or groups of letters. It also moves beyond the 3-cueing reading strategies\* that have been shown to be less effective in teaching all students to read.
  - Our literacy blocks and Intervention programs will reflect the structured and explicit teaching of phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.
- 2. Comprehensive Reading Assessments:
  - The updated assessments will evaluate various aspects of reading, including phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension. This holistic approach provides a complete picture of each student's reading abilities and areas for improvement. (This means we don't give students a reading level anymore and students do not take home levelled leaders, instead students use a text that they can decode on their own using the sounds that they have learnt in class).
- 3. Data-Driven Instruction:
  - By utilising detailed data from these assessments, teachers and leadership staff work collaboratively in regular data meetings to tailor instruction to meet the specific needs of each student. This targeted approach ensures that all students receive the support they need to succeed.

\* The 3 cueing reading strategy—which is also known as three-cueing, or MSV—involves prompting students to draw on context and sentence structure, along with letters, to identify words. But it isn't the most effective way for beginning readers to learn how to decode printed text. Research has shown that encouraging students to check the picture when they come to a tricky word, or to hypothesise what word would work in the sentence, can take their focus away from the word itself—lowering the chances that they'll use their understanding of letter sounds to read through the word part-by-part, and be able to recognize it more quickly the next time they see it. <a href="https://www.edweek.org/teaching-learning/is-this-the-end-of-three-cueing/2020/12">https://www.edweek.org/teaching-learning/is-this-the-end-of-three-cueing/2020/12</a>

### **Expected Outcomes:**

- Improved Reading Proficiency:
  - With these changes, we anticipate a significant improvement in reading proficiency across all grade levels. Our goal is to ensure that every student becomes a confident and competent reader.
- Early Identification of Struggles:
  - The enhanced assessments will help us identify students who are struggling with specific aspects of reading at an early stage. This allows us to intervene promptly and provide the necessary support to prevent further difficulties, with Intervention programs also shifting to a Science of Reading evidence based approach.

- Personalised Learning:
  - The data-driven nature of the new assessments will enable instruction based on individual needs, promoting more effective and engaging learning experiences.

**How Will This Affect Report Results?** As we transition to this new assessment approach, you may notice differences in the results on your child's reading reports. These changes reflect a more accurate and comprehensive understanding of your child's reading abilities. While the initial results may highlight areas that need improvement, they are also a positive step towards addressing these gaps and ensuring long-term success.

In the past you may have noticed that your child was given a reading level and this was an indication of their reading ability. However the research now suggested that there are many other areas to take into consideration.

**Looking Ahead:** We are confident that these changes will have a profound impact on our students' reading development. By embracing the Science of Reading, we are taking a proactive approach to education that prioritises evidence-based practices and personalised learning.

Thank you for your ongoing support as we strive to provide the highest quality education for our students. Together, we can ensure that every child achieves their full potential in reading and beyond.



# Building a national picture of child health

### From May 2024, our school, along with thousands of others across the country, will participate in the Australian Early Development Census (AEDC).

- The AEDC is a teacher-completed census (similar to a questionnaire) which provides a comprehensive picture of how children have developed by the time they start their first year of full-time school.
- The AEDC is an Australian Government Initiative and is completed nationally every three years. Miss Sarah will be completing our school CENSUS on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> June. Children don't miss any class time while the AEDC is completed, and parents/carers don't need to supply schools with any new information.

- The data collected through the AEDC is used by schools, communities and governments to better understand children and families' needs, and identify the services, resources and support they need.
- AEDC data is reported at a school, community, state/territory and national level. AEDC results for individual children are not reported and the AEDC is not used as an individual diagnostic tool.
- Participation in the AEDC is voluntary, however the AEDC relies on all schools with children in their first year of full-time school participating in the collection. <u>Parents/carers don't need to take</u> <u>any action unless they choose not to include</u> <u>their children in the census.</u>
